# Fosdick

A private investigative genealogical thesis on the paternal ancestors of Lucia Ann Fosdick, of OH, WI, & WA in the USA, great-grandmother of Catherine Eames-Jones. All research was carried out on Ancestry.com, the documentation leading to the conclusions set out below can be seen under my username 'Spooksprung' - "Eames-Jones" family. Colonial family records are well preserved, extensive and thoroughly researched by professional scholars and living family descendants. These are preserved in bound volumes at the Library of Congress, which are now available online. I did not therefore have to do any special travels to the US or spend timeless hours scouring badly written parish registers, everything has been carefully laid out in clearly legible documents that are available for all to view for free. It is a great irony that it is easier to trace ancestors in a republic than in Crown lands whose principals they rejected so zealously.

Many derivations of the Fosdick name have been proposed by amateurs and professionals relating to foot for fos and dyke for dick, making him "one with his foot in the ditch" or an association with the actual town named Fosdyke, through which runs the "Fosse Way" in Lincolnshire, therefore topographical, someone who lives near the fosse. Only one Hawyse de Ffosdyk is recorded as ever living in Lincoln (will proved 1314), but was most common in Suffolk from the 16<sup>thC</sup>, suggesting they migrated there, others state that they came over from Holland in the 16<sup>thC</sup> due to religious persecution. The alternate spelling of Forsedick might lead me to suggest some crudity in association with this name, but I shall remain in discretion. So truth is we will never be sure because of these conflicting opinions and lack of factual recorded genealogies of common peoples.

# Lucia Adelle Fosdick (1850-1927)

Great Grandmother to Catherine Gaffney

Born the eldest daughter into a family of 9 in Ohio to William Lawrence a former whaler and farmer, she meets future husband Charles Henry Newton at the end of the Civil War when her family moves to Wisconsin. She an impressionable 15 year old welcomed the hero home no doubt in his smart but war torn uniform and have 13 children in WI before retiring in Tacoma, WA, where she is buried near her husband, who she survived by 12 years. For further info on her children see the 'Newton' thesis by the same author.

Although there are discrepancies in the census records as to the recollection of her & parents places of birth we are certain she is the same person in each as they are the same ages, with same children at the same address consistently. It looks as if she was unsure of her mother's origins. Her 8 siblings each give accurate paternity from records, including her death cert, which is further confirmed by the fortunate possession of a family photo posted online by living family relatives.

Because of the rather sombre attire and countenance, and the fact that the youngest Frank looks around 20, I would might date this to the funeral of their father in 1899, or a family funeral bet. 1900-10, or maybe even at Lucia's husband's funeral in 1915.

# William Lawrence Fosdick (1823-99)

Great Great Grandfather to Catherine Gaffney

There are few documents that give insight into Williams life, but hindsight led him to write a book of his early adventures in the South Pacific, filling in an entirely blank sheet on the activities of this gent. It seems that as an itchy young man seeking adventure on the high seas, he without mulling over the moral & social dilemmas that would prick us in this age, signs up to a whaling ship he says age 15 and travels to the South Pacific from NY.

He is left on the island of Tonga after a year of dangerous whaling by hand, after contracting an ague. He is cared for by the natives, and decides to stay and learn their language, witnessing a war between them and the French and their conversion to Christianity. 3 years later he takes a ship that lands him in Boston via Russia and the Cape, and gets home to Ohio, no doubt with a hero's welcome and fantastic tales, marrying 3 years later to Nancy Ann Richmond, siring 9 children.

10 years later he sets off on another adventure aged 38 with the Civil War shenanigans and comes out on the winning side, purchasing land in the Menasha region of WI, and presumably cultivates this land for the next 20 years while involved in community regulation and church.

He wrote his autobiography 2 years before he died at the bequest of his children to preserve his amazing adventures. The book is remarkably detailed into the minutiae of the life of a ship and tropical islands, even though written 60 years after. It trumps Captain Cook's voyage to those island a few years previous as he ended up shooting lots of them and in turn being clubbed to death. There are however some discrepancies in his dates (see Lawrence, father below).



# Rev. Col. Lawrence Fosdick (1763-1841)

3rd Grandfather to Catherine Gaffney

In William L., his son's autobiography (1897), he writes that after being born in NY 1823 the family moved to Ohio in 1824. His mother died when he was 7 and his father when 14, and he was thereafter cared for by guardian Benjamin Blish and had an uncle who was a ship's captain on Lake Erie who took him to the whaling ports in 1838 aged 15. However his father is certified dead in 1841 with a full obituary, so William L. would have run away from home aged 15. If not and he was under his guardian after his father died he would have been 18 when he joined the whalers, which makes at least better sense due to the dangers. This also works out as he says he stayed on the island of Tonga for 3 years after whaling for 1 year then takes a 1 years to come home arriving back in 1846. Lawrence was 55 when he married a 2<sup>nd</sup> time, accounting for the early death.

William L. was 72 when writing his book, and although it is lucid and factual could he have got some of the dates wrong or embellished his story to make it seems more enticing? Later records state he was born in 1825, others at the end of 1824, which would have made him 13 when he ran away to sea, maybe he was covering for the fact that he was a bad boy in his youth.

Lawrence his father was well known in the shipping community, indeed when William L. arrived at the port in Buffalo, NY from Fairport, OH in 1838 (or '41), a gentleman selling peanuts no less knew his father as "Colonel Fosdick". Living descendant researchers have traced him as living at OH after William L.'s birth, I see no certified evidence that he is the father, but the dates of death of his parents mentioned above match with that of this man. Also Benjamin Blish the 'guardian' is living next door to Lawrence in the 1840 OH census. He married in Massachusetts in 1786 to Hannah Fish but she may have died in childbirth as she produced 1 child. He then remarried Anna Bartholomew in 1818 while in NY, consistent with his son's account above, although I see no certified evidence of that, town records suggest he moved there in 1809. His 3<sup>rd</sup> marriage to Malinda Yeoman was for companionship, he then aged 71. He did not marry a 'Wealthy Warren', the text is a mis-transcript of Leonard Fosdick.

We see from his supposed title as 'colonel' that he may have been raised and served in the revolutionary war. We see that his brother William (next chpt) served for him for 3 months (as a substitute) in 1881 presumably while he was recovering or on leave. His his extra title of reverend suggests that either he may have served that purpose to troops or converted afterwards and was a missionary which is why travelled about so much, possibly.

"Lawrence Fosdick, son of William, lived in the town of Granville, then moved to Livonia, Livingston County, New York. He moved from Livonia to three miles west of Painesville, Ohio. He died there about 1837. He was a farmer. His first wife was Hannah Fish (one child, Elijah); his second wife was Welthy Warren (one child, Warren); his third wife was Ann Bartholomew (two children; Lawrence and Lucy Ann)." from "The Fosdicks" by Marvin Fosdick, pub. ### William Fosdick 1740-1818

4th Great Grandfather to Catherine Gaffney

We have the following account of a biographer writing from information no doubt given by living family relatives:

"William Fosdick was born in England about 1740 and died in New York about 1820. When he was fifteen years old he was forced to serve on an English war ship. When the ship lay at anchor in American waters, he and two comrades deserted. At the time of the French and Indian war (1754-63), he was in Detroit, Michigan. He became a farmer and a nurseryman in the town of Granville, Washington County, New York. He married Dorothy Colt in Connecticut. Their children were William, Lawrence, John, Edward, Martin, Dolly, Molly, Susan, and Sally. All of the boys were stout. Edward could stand in a half bushel measure and shoulder five bushels of wheat and then carry the wheat up a ladder. Dolly married a Webster, Molly married a Davis, Susan married a Swift, and Sally married a Foster." "The Fosdicks" by Marvin Fosdick, published May 1889 in Michigan

This brings into conflict many researchers who state he was born in Charlestown, son of James & Abigal. We can in no way prove his correct origins other than take the word of this family researcher. Thus this family line is terminated here through confusion of 4 different William Fosdicks of the period. He is confused also with his son's William's military service, and probably did not serve in the revolutionary war if he was a deserter from the English, he may have been thought of as a spy. We are 100% sure that he lived and married in Hartford and Hebron due to his son's detailed court testimony in 1834 (below).

### William Fosdick (1762-1851), son of William (1740-1818)

Of interest to this family line is the testimony of William son of William who provided a detail testimony of his activity in the militia from 1781-3 as a fifer (piper) in the CT militia. I give a synopsis of the details here:

20 Oct 1834 State of New York, Allgeny County Court of Common. William Fosdick, Angelica, Allegany NY 72 yrs. Born 27 April 1762 Hartford, CT lived there till 1783. Summer 1778 (16yrs) US army sub for Timothy Cole of East Hartford, CT, fifer, 3 months under Capt Fellows Co. under Col Ledyard. Joined army militia at New London CT, stationed at Fort Griswold.

Oct 1778 home to fathers house East Windsor, Hartford, CT. 8 July 1779 US army sub for Eppe Gilman of Hartland. Joined at Litchfield Courthouse CT under Col Canfield & Capt Tomroys, Lieut Cook militia, fifer. Marched to Danbury drew provisions from stores in a church rest of town burnt. Marched through Bedford, Norwalk & Stanford to Horseneck there till Jan 1780.

Went home to E. Windsor sometimes, there was a sub for brother Lawrence at E.Windsor and marched to East Harvery, Cross? Stratford Ferry through Norwalk. Joined army at Palmers Hill in co. under Capt or Lieut Gaylar under Col Babec, as fifer. Occupied Palmer's House as barracks till spring marched to Horseneck, camped, Col Canfield regt & Col Sheldon of light horse. Was there 9 months then sent home no provisions, but on way home recalled to Horseneck, next morn Major Andre was captured as a spy. Served as sub for Mr Humphrey.

Aug 1780 in 70 men under Capt Gaylor & Lieut Cook, chased by mounted refugees under Dullensor, Lieut Cook badly wounded. Col Sheldon light horse came to relief, routing the refugees, killing

some. Went home to his fathers house in East Windsor, Oct 1780 (18 yrs). 1st Aug 1781 drafted into militia at Fort Griswald as fifer in Capt Andrews Co.3 months, repairing fort. Returned home fathers house in East Windsor Nov 1781.

March 1783 moved to New Lebanon, Columbia, NY 2 yrs. 3 yrs in Lanesbourough, Berkshire, MA. 43 yrs Hartford, Washington, NY. 4 years Angelica, Allegany, NY. Brother Nathan Fosdick, Conesus, Livingston, NY. Mentions his family bible. Served 3 months on privateer sloop or Warship Randolph (1781, under Augustus Peck Commander Nicoll Fosdick on board relation?)

### Further Research for Ascendants of William Fosdick (1740-1818)

Other researchers state William the father was born in Charlestown, MA in 1741, son of James and Abigail, which is confirmed in the baptism, but parentage is not confirmed in his marriage certificate to Dorothy Colt as above in CT, neither are his details entered into the family bible of his son that he used as evidence in court and still extant. So what happened to that William? history does not recall. The thesis that William is son of James has been accepted by the 'Sons of the Revolutionary War' organisation which checks their facts thoroughly, but rejected by the 'Mayflower Society'.

So I was initially in quite a quandary whom to believe on this matter. As he does not have a double barrelled name he may be confused with another William and is so later with his same named son. Could he even have been a cousin who came to help his family in the war? Another William son of William is recorded in Charlestown as born in 1735. There is also a William son of John born in Lexington 1739, where our William was reported married.

After careful consideration I suspected that the biography above written 70 yrs after his death might be erroneous and given by uninformed relatives, a more thorough researcher, Raymond Blaine Fosdick also suggests he is erroneous on some aspects, but the article was written in before 1889, and would have come from living descendants, and they would have more validity of claim than I a stranger 120 years out of time. Could those relatives have been lying to cover for some misdemeanour? I see no evidence as yet.

I also thought it would also be quite ridiculous for an Englishman who fought against the Americans to have married, settled and been given land in the US after their defeat and return to England unless there were exceptional circumstances. The fact is that he deserted from the English Navy in 1753 in the Indian-French war, when US was still a colony, so did not indeed fight the Americans and was probably allowed to be naturalised after a period on the run.

It all hinges on whether we can prove he was born in England or US, and would be quite impossible if he came from England at that time. So without concrete evidence and the glaring fact that this William could be one of four people, I had to discontinue my search and can only give supplementary details of what he may have got up to, based possibly on the activities of 4 different people. Thus I cannot with any certainty link him with the Charlestown founding families which is a great pity as I spent considerable time and excitement researching that illustrious family. But it made for good reading!
