
# Poynter, Brushmakers of Exeter & Plymouth, 1776-1969



This paper attempts to trace the antecedents of the author along his grandmother's maternal tree. The line to his great-great grandfather is fully confirmed with documents, photos, medals and 1<sup>st</sup> hand witnesses still extant in the family. Stretching back another two generations is a very simple task due to the scarcity of the surname at the time in Devon and well oiled search engines. However the line stops abruptly at this point (in 1776) and will require extensive "work at the coalface" to get around the brick-wall.

The surname Poynter according to various genealogists derives from the occupation for the maker of cord that fastened a doublet (a lined waistcoat) with hose (men's stockings). The name derives from the Middle English "poynte" and originally from the Latin "puncta", meaning to pierce. Poynter may be (also) an Anglicised variant of the Huguenot name 'Pointier'. I have no proof so far that our Poynter line fled from France during the revolution or that they came in with the Normans, as there is yet no reliable trace of the furthest ancestor, William Pointer, before 1801. It could even be less so romantic an origin and simply derive from the occupation of "pointing" cement on brickwork, or even pointing spears in the front ranks of a battle ground. Variations of the surname that could have proceeded the former might have been Painter, Point, Poyntz, le Puintur, Pointner

# Kate Francina Poynter, 1882-1969

Daughter of Albert Poynter (p.11)
G. Grandmother to the author

The family connections with Poynter begin with the marriage of **Kate Francis Poynter** to a **Percy Frank Dashper** in Plymouth, 1910. He seems to be a man of many trades, and always a sharp but modestly dressed well groomed gentleman from the family photo album 1920-50, the type of respectable chap who wore a full lounge suit on the summer beach. In 1901 directly following his schooling he began an apprenticeship as an 'outfitter' one presumes for gentlemen's clothing in Plymouth city. In 1911 he is described as an "unemployed travelling brewer's salesman", suggesting he visited pubs, inns and hotels gathering orders for beer supplies.

In 1939 he was a collector of monies from repayment meters (one may suggest gas & electric), and a sergeant in the Air Raid Precaution patrols (A.R.P.) during World War II. This involved issuing gas masks, erecting air raid shelters, guiding civilians to bomb shelters, extinguishing lights in the blackout, rescuing people from bombed areas. Plymouth, the home of the Royal Navy was heavily bombarded during this time, suggesting he was a busy fellow. He received a 5 year service medal at the end of the war for his conduct and in his father's will of 1954 he is described as a "retired rate office inspector". A medal was presented to him around this time for services as Vice President to the Association of Conservative Clubs, family lore suggests he was active in promoting Baroness Joan Vickers to Parliament opposed to Michael Foot in 1945-55. My father remembers him as a jolly and slightly eccentric chap when he came to visit the grandchildren, dressing up in women's clothes, driving toy cars etc. His father in turn, **William Thomas** was a shipwright and recorder at H.M. Docks.

**Kate** was the ever dutiful wife, the census suggests that after her stint as a dressmaker before marriage she maintained the family home, where they co-habited with Percy's parents. The cramped conditions may suggest why they only had one child, **Vera Kate** in 1910.

There is one remarkable incident concerning Kate that appeared in the local newspapers reporting on an inquest into a fatal collision on 6<sup>th</sup> Aug 1939. She was driving with passengers, husband **Percy** and step-parents **William & Catherine Dashper** to Washfield where her daughter **Vera** lived at the local 'police house' with husband **PC Kenneth Burton**. A "group" of visiting Dutch cyclists suddenly appeared at a dangerous corner, at the bottom of Long Drag in Tiverton, two ploughing into her "Hillman Minx grey Coupee". **Kors Albert van der Veer** aged 20 from Amsterdam suffered fatal injuries, dying later in hospital.

A policeman witnessed the incident and all testimonies found that Kate was driving sensibly, and so the cause of death was recorded as an accident, but she never drove again. Representatives of the Dashpers were sent to the funeral in Tiverton. We have a picture of the car a few years before the incident, a popular end of range car before the company went into military production. She survived her husband by 9 years and died at 51 Belair Road with daughter Vera and left a considerable sum of £1663.





# Albert John Poynter, 1878-1960

# Son of Albert Poynter (p.11) Great-Grand Uncle to the author

Albert persisted as a horse & cab diver, ferrying customers throughout Plymouth and later possibly from the popular train station at Yeovil in Somerset. In World War I he served to the rank of Sergeant, 11<sup>th</sup> Royal Fusiliers, based in London. It appears from a bar on his Victory war medal that he served in one of the battles of Champagne 1915-16 where he presumably was assisting French forces, which was a horrific field of combat and carnage. Unfortunately his army papers have not survived, so there is no clue of his later service or injuries. He never married, and definitely had no children, leaving £971 to Kate his sister in 1960.





# Albert Poynter, 1856-1912

# Father to Kate Francina Poynter (p.4) G.G. Grandfather to the author

Born in the centre of Exeter city into a family of brush-makers, Albert was destined to follow in this trade, and indeed apprenticed in the craft. Luckily however the family were also based in Plymouth, where following an adequate schooling was recruited into the Royal Navy age 16 in 1871, witnessed by his brother Henry who joined up at the same time. He stayed therein until 1894, a 23 year career, where he served with distinction, climbing through the ranks to become a Chief Petty Officer, the most senior non commissioned rank with the role of boatswain, responsible for the steering and navigation of the ship.

He travelled widely during his career to Europe and India, but was mainly based in ports or the channel. The only significant war action he took part in was the 1882 Anglo-Egypt war. The Royal Navy took part therein shelling the city of Alexandria to defuse the armament of the town. This was all in support of the Khedive of Egypt over an uprising against his rule, protecting British interests, notably the Suez canal. HMS Northumberland the ship he was stationed on at the time is not listed in those that took part in this battle, however naval researchers do recognise her presence there, so I imagine she must have been a support ship. In 1881 she was stationed in Gibraltar, so plenty time to get to Egypt. Indeed he received the Khedive's Star, a medal issued by Egypt for those who served in the battles, date stamped 1882. He also received his good conduct medal in 1884, and continued in service for another 10 years.

He sired four children with **Sarah Jane**, daughter of **John Ellis Lucock** who came from a long line of fishermen. There is an anomaly here I cannot explain in which **Kate** was born in Aug 1882, 5 months after her brother **Sydney** in March 1882, both are well documented people.



**Coxswain:** The person who has charge of the boat and crew in the absence of officers. On a man-of-war, the Captain's coxswain ranked high among the petty officers and had charge of the Captain's boat and attends him. Later they were the senior Chief Petty Officer aboard a smaller vessel such as a corvette or submarine, who was responsible for the steering and also assumed the duties which would be performed by the Chief Boatswain's Mate and Master-at-Arms aboard larger vessels.

**Boatswain's mate:** The most versatile member of the Coast Guard's operational team is the boatswain's mate (BM). Boatswain's mates are masters of seamanship. BMs are capable of performing almost any task in connection with deck maintenance, small boat operations, navigation, and supervising all personnel assigned to a ship's deck force

# **Henry Poynter, 1851-1905**

# Brother to Albert Poynter (p.11) G.G. Grand-Uncle to the Author

Contrary to the family enterprise, but maybe assisting in it, Henry apprenticed in sail-making which put him in good stead when he joined the Royal Navy with his brother Albert in 1873. He continued in this craft until his death, never being promoted beyond the rank of Sailmaker, which was a mid ranking Petty Officer. Although coming to the end of the sail days there were plenty of canvases, flags, awning and smaller ships that travelled by sail, implicating he was forever mending, making and managing canvas sheets. Burials at sea were sown into canvas, lazy sailors might even tip him with beer to sow on his badges or repair a torn trouser leg. He was often seen on the same ships as his brother, even at the same time, he also received his good conduct medal the same month as him in 1884.

He married twice, 1<sup>st</sup> to **Mary Frances** daughter of **William Connabeer**, a carpenter supposedly with one child, **Thomas Edwin**. However it seems that as he was almost permanently at sea his 1st wife "played the field" as it were and remarried a royal marine, taking the boy with her who took the surname **Taylor**. His 2<sup>nd</sup> was **Mary Jane**, a widow with 10 children, daughter of **Richard Credicott**,, an agricultural labourer.

He has also the dubious accolade of being one of the few people with double entries in the census. It seems that while the enumerators were taking the census in the streets, there were separate census being taken by the Captain's of ships abroad or at sea from the lists of personal, as they trusted the efficiency of the navy. For example the 1881 census was taken while Henry was on-board HMS Briton, stationed down in the Cape of Good Hope, S. Africa. By the time the completed census travelled back to the enumerator's office in England, he was back home on leave in Plymouth.

I find no accurate trace of his death suggesting he may have lived away from Plymouth or abroad in his retirement.

John, born in the Exeter workhouse certainly received an apprenticeship in brush-making, but because of his father's "dabblings in crime" (see next entry, p.22) he seems to have left home early and worked for a time on a manor farm known as Great Dockham or Doccombe in Moretonhampstead leased by the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury, we may assume because of his origins in the workhouse that this may have been work charitably provided by the church.

On his father's presumed release from prison around 1836 the wider family moved to Plymouth, where John met and married Elizabeth Tavener the daughter of a toll booth collector based on the outskirts. Evidence from his children's baptisms locations suggests he plied his brush-making trade between Exeter, Mortenhamsptead and Plymouth, and this is how he may have met her from regular passage. He thereafter makes enough profit to run his own business, as listed in the local trade directory based at 28, John Street in the heart of Plymouth (now under the library).

In 1881 he finds himself a patient in South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, being treated for some never-to-be-known malady, but recovered before dying age 64 in 1889 in his home town of Exeter. His wife survived him by 12 years, becoming a laundress to make ends meet. He had five children:

- **Henry Poynter** (see above entry, p. 16)
- John Poynter becomes a house painter (free brushes from his father?!) and remains so for all his working life, siring 7 children in the London area with an **Ann Amelia**, daughter of **Thomas** Redmore a mason
- **Albert Poynter** (see above entry, p.11)
- Elizabeth Mary Poynter married a John James Harris, a boatswain in the coastguard raising 7 children in the North of England
- Walter James Poynter took the family craft, becoming a master brush-maker for over 40 years. He specialised in pan handling, thus dipping the bunched hairs or bristles into a pan of pitch before affixing to the handle. Although he married young to a Maria Shipley, daughter of a prison guard, he produced no children alive or dead

# Richard Poynter 1801-1843

### Father to John Richard Poynter (see entry above, p.19) G.G.G.G. Grandfather to the author

Richard, born in Plymouth apprentices in brush-making for 7 years from age 14, and marries on attaining his mastery age 21 to an **Anne**, daughter of **John Perkins**, possibly a farm worker, in 1820. Due to unfortunate circumstances of the period he finds himself first living in the poor quarter of Preston Street, noted for hostelries, prostitution and rowdy inns, and by 1824 the family were inmates of the local workhouse, but still continued with his trade.

His outlook was so poor he stooped to the levels of criminality to feed his family, and is caught stealing a "pair of breeches" from a William Rawlins, a labourer up in Clifton (Bristol) and is sent to Gloucestershire gaol in 1822 for one month. We are 100% sure it is our man, as his name and occupation (brushmaker) is unique in Exeter at the time, and happened but 6 days after his first child's (William Thomas) baptism. It was also common for brushmakers to travel in a wide circuit plying their trade. We have a unique description of his facial features from the court records, which, if you compare it to a picture of his direct descendant **Albert John Poynter** (page 10), you will remark at the similarities.

Gloucester Gaol Register, 22<sup>nd</sup> Feb 1822. Accused: Richard Poynter. Brushmaker, Exeter. Marks, Stature, Etc: Light brown hair. Light brown eyes, dark sallow complexion, long face, large nose, a scar on his forehead, two moles on his right cheek, a large mole between his shoulders. Several small moles on his back, a pock mark right side his nose. Can read and write. Height 5'5".

It appears he was in and out of jail and poverty, and the records indicate he may have been transported to Australia, as there is a large gap between 1824 and the birth of his next child in 1837. A newspaper report and ships records record a Richard Poynter being transported for life to N.S.W. for robbery in 1826 at the Old Bailey. Whether through penance, hard work and favouritism he managed to gain a pardon after 10 years I am note sure, it was known, but I cannot actually prove it is him at this moment.

It may not be so contrived, and that he simply took his brush-making trade to other cities between those years before moving back to Exeter, however a wide search for any baptisms of children by him in any other area between those years gives no results. The oldest child on the 1841 census is 5, so you would expect to see some older children if he had indeed had any elsewhere returning with him. It is possible that he may have left his wife in Exeter while he was a journeyman brush-maker, but 10 years seems a long stretch if he was a freeman. Otherwise did he contract a long term disease that affected his fertility? Syphilis etc?

Whatever actually happened we are sure though that he has returned in 1837 as we have the same named man baptising his child in that year, in the same church, living at the same address, with same trade, and same wife as in 1825, too many matching facts to be fable. The family was definitely back on track around 1841 having moved to Plymouth, living at Willow Street, where estranged sons **John Richard** & **William Thomas** join them in the immediate area around this time from Exeter to set up a family brush-making enterprise and later to care for their widowed mother, as Richard died an early death age of 43 in 1843. Since 3 of his sons also died before they were 40, and one of those from tuberculosis, I deem this was probably their fate in insanitary Victorian Plymouth. Of his children:

- **William Thomas Poynter** continues the trade of brushmaker in Exeter before moving to join the wider family in Plymouth around 1845 marrying a **Susannah** daughter of **George Benbow** a labourer. They rear 7 children, but dies young age 37. His wife continues to work as a charwoman living next door to her brother-in-law **John Richard Poynter** (p.19)
- **John Richard Poynter** (see above entry, p.19)
- Mary Ann Poynter marries William Alexander a soldier in around 1865 but appear to produce no children, although they may have married abroad. She takes in her widowed mother Anne in 1881 then aged 80 at Willow Street, Plymouth
- Thomas Poynter is set to task hawking his fathers brushes, but is dead by 1857 age 19

• Richard Poynter becomes a mason, whether he was master at his craft it is difficult to say as he also died of tuberculosis at a young age 39 and childless after marrying twice to a **Susan** and an **Emma**, surnames unknown



## William Pointer c.1776-1855

# Father to Richard Poynter above (p.22) G.G.G.G. Grandfather to the author

There is firm convincing evidence to state that William is the father of Richard. There is only one baptism for a Richard Poynter found so far in the in the whole of the U.K. in the appropriate date range and that is for a Richard Pointer baptised in 1801 in Plymouth, St. Andrews. This is where Richard came to live and work after his sojourning in Exeter and Australia. Concerning the difference between Poynter and Pointer, surnames often changes over the centuries due to changes in language, illiteracy and spelling, or lack of it. Considering Richard ends up in the workhouse and later in court and prison,

William may even have been a captured soldier or religious refugee from France, the surname is not uniquely English, and was born around the time of the French Revolution and Napoleonic Wars. However to counter that theory, all his children and descendants have uniquely English names, and I find no variations of the Poynter name anywhere in lists of known Huguenots who came to Devon, unless it was drastically changed from something like Poyntz. Richard was certainly apprenticed locally in the brushmakers trade, at the time a respected and secret guild, evidenced by his marriage age 21yrs, employment: brush-maker, the age of release from a 7 year apprenticeship.

I suspect he may have outlived his son and there is only one William Pointer found in the 1841 census, listed as a "Dissenter's Minister", suggesting or hinting at religious persecution, giving some credence to the theory above, but this alone is no proof it is him.

### **Brushmaking - A Snippet into the Craft**

Brushmaking is a very wide term and could encompass those used for brushing paint, hair, yards, animals, teeth, furniture, make-up or toilets and I am sure that the Poynter family would have dabbled in all these areas with their inherited skills through 3 generations.

The finest brushes of the 1800s were made of wild boar bristles, the best being imported from Russia. Raw bundles were bought from importers which were combed, sorted, graded and greased. A magical mystery of the craft was to ensure that all the bristles were facing the right way. This was done by simple rubbing a stick over a pile of hairs, and because of their tapered structure would separate neatly into 2 piles, tip up and root up.

The bundles are then passed to the pan-handlers, 4 men who stand each side of an upright oven powered by charcoal, keeping a pan of pitch very hot. They pinch the bundles at the root and dip them into the pitch and tie with a "thrum" a piece of yarn, dip a 2nd time and then push them into the hole of the prepared wood stock and twist to fan the hairs. This would be repeated depending on the number of holes making up the stock. The amount of bristles used per brush was measured by experience and a time served master would make brushes of almost equal weight.

The stock would be prepared by foot treadled lathe drill the required amount of holes, without a gauge, and each at a different angle, for example the side holes of a brush point more outwards than the inner.
